Visa and Residency Requirements

Tourist Visa / Visa-Free Stay

- **Restrictions:** Must leave after 365 days (can return immediately)

Temporary Residence Permit

 - Reliability: Generally good in cities
 - Payment: Online, bank, or payment terminals
- **Water:**
 - Cost: Flat rate or metered (5-20 GEL monthly)
 - Quality: Not potable in most areas without filtering
 - Reliability: Occasional outages
- **Heating:**
 - Natural gas most common
 - Cost: Seasonal variation, 50-200 GEL monthly in winter
 - Alternatives: Electric, wood stoves in rural areas
- **Internet and Mobile:**
 - Internet: 30-60 GEL monthly for high-speed
 - Mobile plans: 10-30 GEL monthly for generous data
 - Installation: Quick in urban areas

Household Help

- **Domestic Help:**
 - Cleaning: 10-20 GEL per hour
 - Full-time help: 400-800 GEL monthly
 - Gardening/Maintenance: 15-25 GEL per hour
- **Finding Help:**
 - Word of mouth most common
 - Facebook groups and local agencies

- Language considerations important

Social Life and Activities

- **Expatriate Community:**
 - Active in Tbilisi and Batumi
 - Regular meetups and events
 - Facebook groups: "Expats in Tbilisi," "Expats in Georgia"
- **Local Integration:**
 - Georgian hospitality makes connection easier
 - Language barrier can be challenging
 - Cultural activities provide connection points
- **Recreation:**
 - Hiking and outdoor activities
 - Thermal spas and mineral baths
 - Cultural events and festivals
 - Wine tours and tastings

Seasonal Considerations

- **Summer:** Hot in lowlands, perfect in mountains
- **Fall:** Harvest season, wine festivals
- **Winter:** Cold in mountains, mild at coast
- **Spring:** Beautiful but rainy in many regions
