- Clean criminal record
- Basic health certificate
- No age minimum (though typically for retirees)

Benefits and Discounts

Pensionados receive numerous discounts, including: - 50% off entertainment (movies, concerts, sports events) - 30% off public transportation (buses, trains, boats) - 25% off airline tickets - 25% off restaurant meals - 25% off monthly utility bills - 20% off medical services - 20% off professional services - 15% off hospital bills (if no insurance applies) - 15% off dental and eye exams - 10% off prescription medications - One-time import tax exemption for household goods (up to \$10,000) - Tax exemption for importing a new car every two years

Application Process

1. Gather required documents (proof of pension income, police record, health certificate, etc.)
2. Have documents authenticated and apostilled in the U.S.
3. Hire a Panamanian attorney to process the application
4. Submit application to Panama's National Immigration Service
5. Receive provisional visa while permanent visa is processed
6. Obtain permanent residency card and cedula (national ID)

Timeline and Costs

- Processing time: 3-6 months
- Legal fees: \$2,000-\$3,000
- Government fees: \$800-\$1,000
- Permanent visa is good for life with no renewals required

Cost of Living Breakdown

Panama offers an affordable lifestyle, particularly outside Panama City:

Many retirees report living well on \$2,000-\$2,500 per month, including rent. This is achievable on typical Social Security benefits, especially for couples combining their income.

Healthcare System and Insurance

Panama offers high-quality, affordable healthcare options:

Public Healthcare

- Available to legal residents
- Very low cost (often free for routine care)
- Quality varies by location
- Longer wait times for non-emergency procedures
- Spanish language typically required

Private Healthcare

- Excellent facilities, especially in Panama City
- Costs 50-75% less than equivalent U.S. care
- Doctor visit: \$40-\$70
- Specialist consultation: \$50-\$100
- Many doctors trained in U.S. or Europe
- English widely spoken in private facilities

Insurance Options

1. **Local Private Insurance:** \$60-\$150/month depending on age and coverage

Social Security

- Direct deposit to U.S. bank account (most common)
- Direct deposit to Panamanian bank (requires enrollment in International Direct Deposit)

Taxation

- Panama does not tax foreign-source income
- U.S. citizens must file U.S. tax returns regardless of residence
- Foreign Earned Income Exclusion and Foreign Tax Credit may apply
- No tax on interest earned in Panamanian banks

Safety and Security

Panama is generally considered one of the safer countries in Latin America:

Crime Rates

- Low violent crime against tourists and expatriates
- Petty theft occurs in urban areas
- Rural areas generally very safe
- Exercise normal precautions as in any country

Safer Regions for Retirees

- Boquete and highland areas

- El Valle de Antón
- Coronado (gated communities)
- Pedasi and rural Azuero Peninsula

General Safety Tips

- Use common sense precautions
- Avoid displaying wealth
- Be cautious in certain areas of Panama City (especially at night)
- Learn basic Spanish for emergencies

Language Considerations

While English is widely spoken in expat areas, Spanish proficiency enhances the experience:

English Prevalence

- Common in tourist areas, Panama City, and expat communities
- Many professionals and service providers speak English
- Less common in rural areas and among older Panamanians

Learning Spanish

- Many language schools in expat areas
- Private tutors affordable (\$10-\$20/hour)
- Online options: Babbel, Duolingo, Rosetta Stone
- Language exchange programs with locals

Communication Tips

- Learn basic Spanish phrases for daily interactions
- Translation apps helpful for complex situations
- Patient, friendly approach goes a long way
- Many Panamanians appreciate efforts to speak Spanish

Transportation

Getting around Panama offers several options:

Within Cities

- Taxis: Abundant and affordable (\$2-\$5 for most city trips)

- Uber: Available in Panama City
- Buses: Comprehensive network, very affordable
- Metro: Modern system in Panama City

Between Cities

- Domestic flights: Connect major destinations
- Luxury buses: Comfortable and affordable
- Panama Canal Railway: Scenic option between Panama City and Colón

Owning a Vehicle

- Valid U.S. license usable for 90 days, then Panamanian license required
- Fuel costs similar to U.S.
- Import taxes waived for Pensionados (once every two years)
- Insurance affordable (\$500-\$800 annually)

International Travel

- Tocumen International Airport offers excellent connections
- Direct flights to many U.S. cities
- Copa Airlines hub with extensive Latin American network

Can I use Medicare in Panama? No, Medicare does not generally cover healthcare outside the U.S. You'll need to purchase private insurance or pay out-of-pocket for healthcare in Panama. However, certain Medicare Advantage programs now have direct pay service arrangements with several hospitals in Panama City and David (near Boquete).

How does the Panamanian healthcare system compare to the U.S.? Panama offers high-quality private healthcare at 50-75% lower costs than the U.S. Many doctors are U.S.-trained and speak English, particularly in Panama City.

Will I lose my Social Security benefits if I move to Panama? No, U.S. citizens can receive Social Security benefits while living in Panama. You can have them deposited in a U.S. or Panamanian bank account.

Do I need to speak Spanish? While you can get by with English in expat areas and tourist zones, learning basic Spanish significantly enhances your experience and is helpful for daily interactions.

Can I bring my pets to Panama? Yes, pets can be imported with proper documentation, including health certificates and vaccination records. The process is straightforward.

Is there a minimum stay requirement to maintain residency? For Pensionado visa holders, there is no minimum stay requirement to maintain residency status, making it ideal for those who wish to travel frequently.

What about hurricanes and natural disasters? Panama is located outside the hurricane belt and experiences few natural disasters. Occasional flooding during the rainy season is the main concern in some areas.

Panama offers American retirees an affordable, accessible, and comfortable retirement option with exceptional benefits through the Pensionado program. With proper planning and an open mind, retiring in Panama can provide an excellent quality of life on a modest budget.
