Visa and Residency Requirements

Romania offers several residency options for retirees:

Long-stay Visa (Type D)

- Initial validity of 90 days to one year
- Must apply at Romanian embassy or consulate in the U.S.
- Requires proof of accommodation, health insurance, and financial means

Temporary Residence Permit

- Valid for 1-5 years, renewable
- Income requirement: Approximately €700/month (about \$760) from a permanent source
- Must register with immigration authorities within 90 days of arrival
- Can lead to permanent residency after 5 years

Process Overview

1. Apply for Type D visa at Romanian consulate in the U.S.
2. Enter Romania and register with the Immigration Office
3. Apply for temporary residence permit
4. Provide proof of income, accommodation, and health insurance

5. Obtain residence card

Other Visa Options

- **Property Owner Visa:** For those purchasing property in Romania
- **Family Reunification:** For those with Romanian spouses or relatives
- **Self-employed Visa:** For those starting a business

Safer Regions for Retirees

- Most Transylvanian cities (Braşov, Sibiu, Cluj-Napoca)
- Upscale districts in Bucharest
- Smaller tourist towns

General Safety Tips

- Standard precautions against petty theft in tourist areas
- Avoid isolated areas at night

- Use registered taxis or ride-sharing services
- Be cautious of wildlife in rural areas (bears in mountain regions)
