Many retirees report living well on \$1,500-\$2,000 per month, including rent. This is achievable on typical Social Security benefits, even for single retirees.

### Regional Cost Variations

- **Ho Chi Minh City:** Highest costs, especially in Districts 1, 2, and 7
- **Hanoi:** Slightly lower than HCMC
- **Da Nang/Hoi An:** 20-30% lower than HCMC
- **Smaller Cities** (Nha Trang, Dalat, Vung Tau): Significantly lower costs

### Healthcare System and Insurance

## Taxation

- Vietnam taxes worldwide income for tax residents (183+ days in Vietnam)

- No tax treaty between U.S. and Vietnam
- Consider consulting with a tax specialist familiar with both systems

## Safety and Security

### Crime Rates

- Motorbike snatch-and-grab theft occurs in major cities

- Vinasun and Mai Linh are reputable companies
- Starting fare around 10,000-15,000 VND (\$0.40-\$0.60)
- **Ride-hailing apps:** Grab, Be, GoJek
- Both car and motorbike options
- Often cheaper than traditional taxis
- **Buses:** Very affordable but challenging for non-Vietnamese speakers

## Between Cities

- Domestic flights (numerous airlines, affordable)
- Trains (scenic but slower)
- Long-distance buses (varying comfort levels)
- Private car hire

## International Travel

- International airports in Hanoi, Ho Chi Minh City, Da Nang
- Good connections throughout Asia
- Direct flights to U.S. from HCMC and Hanoi

You'll need to purchase private insurance or self-insure given the affordable healthcare costs.

**How does the Vietnamese healthcare system compare to the U.S.?** Vietnam's healthcare system is still developing. While basic care is affordable and accessible, quality varies significantly. International hospitals in major cities provide good care for routine matters, but serious conditions often require medical tourism to Thailand, Singapore, or Malaysia.

**Will I lose my Social Security benefits if I move to Vietnam?** No, U.S. citizens can receive Social Security benefits while living in Vietnam. You can have them deposited in a U.S. bank account and access funds via ATM or transfer services.

**Can I own property in Vietnam?** Foreigners cannot own land in Vietnam but can purchase apartments in commercial projects with a 50-year renewable leasehold. Houses can only be "owned" through long-term leases or by establishing a Vietnamese company.

**What about the relationship between Americans and Vietnamese given the war history?** Despite the complex history, Vietnamese people are generally very welcoming to Americans. The population is predominantly young (born after the war), and the country has embraced a forward-looking attitude. Many Vietnamese have family members in the U.S. and view Americans positively.

**Is there a retirement visa for Vietnam?** Vietnam does not currently offer a specific retirement visa. Most retirees use tourist visas, business visas, or investor visas, often requiring periodic visa runs or working with visa agencies for renewals.

**How is the internet and technology infrastructure?** Vietnam has surprisingly good internet infrastructure with fiber connections available in urban areas. Mobile coverage is comprehensive, and technology services are modern and reliable in cities.
